Murderers get prison tariff cut

Two men who stabbed a mother of five to death in her home have had their minimum sentence cut.

Carl Brady, 29, and James Paton, 25, of no fixed address but from Leeds, pleaded guilty at Bradford Crown Court in March to murdering Diane Ruane, 51, and wounding her husband Christopher Ruane, 59, with intent, at their home in New Lane, Laisterdyke.

Paton, who inflicted the fatal blows, received a tariff of 24 years and 139 days after time on remand was considered while Brady was given 20 years and 139 days.

Yesterday, at London's Court of

Appeal, lawyers successfully argued the tariffs were too long. Mr Justice Holman, with Lord Justice Tuckey and Mr Justice Cooke, said the trial judge, the Recorder of Bradford, Stephen Gullick, had given too much weight to the aggravating features of the murder.

They ordered that Paton's tariff be cut to 22 years 139 days and Brady's 16 years and 139 days.

Both will only be freed if they convince the Parole Board they are no longer a danger. Even if released, they will remain on "life licence" and will face prison if

they step out of line. Mr Justice Holman said Mrs Ruane was killed on July 12, 2005, as she tried to protect her husband at their home.

Paton and Brady, who were living in a nearby hostel, had called at the house at around 2pm and attacked Mr Ruane, who was stabbed in the neck, ribs and arm.

Mrs Ruane was upstairs and when she came down saw her husband being set upon.

"This was a truly horrendous event and no one can hear those facts without profound sympathy for Mr Ruane and his family," said the judge.
